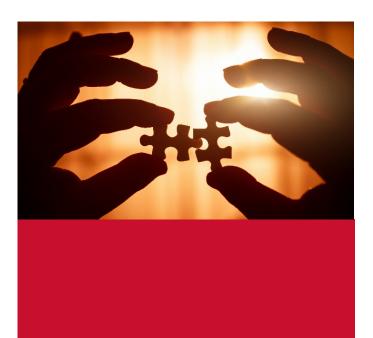

# 1 MTP Overview and Context

The 2040 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) will cast the vision for what transportation will look like in the Anchorage Bowl and Chugiak-Eagle River for the next 20 years. Anchorage Metropolitan Area Transportation Solutions (AMATS) is the joint state-local planning process for the Municipality of Anchorage (MOA), a designated Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO). As an MPO, Anchorage is authorized to receive Federal Highway Trust Fund dollars. AMATS oversees the planning and programming of these funds to improve the surface transportation system within the urbanized area of the Municipality of Anchorage. Through the MTP process, AMATS decides what transportation improvements our community needs to keep up with the economy and changing population. This recurring planning process generally happens every 4 years. The MTP is essentially the master plan for transportation in the Anchorage Bowl and Chugiak-Eagle River. Projects listed in the MTP are eligible for federal funding or development. The plan also includes recommendations on mobility, congestion, air quality, public transportation, non-motorized transportation, and other issues.

In the last major update, the 2035 Metropolitan Transportation Plan consolidated the sub-area long-range transportation plans for the Anchorage Bowl and Chugiak-Eagle River into one MTP with a single set of goals, objectives, recommendations, and combined MTP budget, while recognizing differences between the two areas, particularly with regard to policies. The 2035 MTP addressed congestion-related and non-congestion-related issues, including those identified by the communities through their respective comprehensive land-use plans. The Interim 2035 MTP was developed to extend the life of the 2035 MTP with a new Air Quality Conformity Determination, while retaining the assumptions and recommendations of the 2035 MTP.

The 2040 MTP will continue in the same direction, while reflecting the new Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century (MAP-21) focus on an objectives-based, performance-driven approach, and new emphasis areas of the 2015 "FAST" Act (Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act) including freight. MAP-21 reinforced the eight planning factors introduced by SAFETEA-LU (the Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users of 2005), and established a performance- and outcome-based program with an objective for states and MPOs to invest in projects that will make progress toward national performance goals for the Federal highway program. The FAST Act continues MAP-21's overall performance management approach.

The 2040 MTP will be implementable, identifying and prioritizing transportation projects that can move forward for planning, design, and construction. Key areas of interest that the plan will address include:

• Current fiscal climate and how it affects future growth

- Changing demographics, with a desire for more transportation options such as transit
- Long-term congestion management
- Adopted updates to the Municipality of Anchorage Land Use Plan.

As the MTP is developed, this list will grow and change with public input.

The MTP will be developed using an efficient and inclusive outreach process. It is the best opportunity for involving the public to determine policy guidance and transportation priorities. To this end, Guiding Principles were developed. These Guiding Principles were based on previous plans and community values and reflect AMATS' desire to engage in a collaborative and continuous transportation planning process. Essentially, these guiding principles represent the planning team's commitment to each other and to 2040 MTP stakeholders – the elected officials, various committee members, and especially the residents of Anchorage.

The Guiding Principles for the MTP 2040 Update are:

- Pursue meaningful public involvement
- Seek to understand all ideas and viewpoints
- Be responsive to the public
- Conduct an open and inclusive process
- Follow guidance provided by the AMATS Technical Advisory Committee and **Policy Committee**
- Promote opportunities that involve traditionally underserved and underrepresented residents in the transportation planning process
- Analyze and display data so that it is clear for decision makers and the public
- Seek to build public understanding
- Listen to and reflect the public's concerns and aspirations in the alternatives developed
- Provide feedback on how public input influenced the decision
- Create a user-friendly, readable, and understandable plan
- Create a plan that is multimodal, and reflects changing demographics and changing desires of Anchorage's population
- Integrate the 2040 transportation plan update with the overall planning process in Anchorage
- Integrate land use planning into the transportation plan in a more direct, intentional, and strategic way
- Seek to develop a plan that is consistent with the goals and objectives of Anchorage's adopted plans, including sub-area Comprehensive Plans, and which continues to foster the implementation of those goals and objectives
- Comply with local, state, and federal requirements
- Adhere to the schedule and budget.

The rest of this Public Involvement Plan (PIP) describes the plan to identify and engage plan stakeholders throughout the MTP development and approval process.



The 2040 MTP must be completed by November 19, 2019. Together, AMATS and the community/planning partners can develop a long-term vision for our transportation system and finish the plan update efficiently.

# 2 Public Involvement Guidance

This PIP has been developed to be compliant with the AMATS PPP and consistent with all the regulations and guidance documents listed therein. Please refer to the AMATS Public Participation Plan, Appendix A, for a comprehensive list of applicable regulations.

# 3 Study Area

The study area is the AMATS Planning Boundary within the MOA. The area includes the urbanized areas of the Anchorage Bowl and Chugiak-Eagle River. Please refer to Appendix B, AMATS Boundary Map.

# 4 Strategy

Effective community engagement is essential to developing an MTP for AMATS that reflects community desires. This plan outlines a broad-based public engagement process that strives to provide a variety of communication channels to engage a wide cross-section of the Anchorage and Eagle River communities. The PIP builds upon, but does not repeat, the recent MOA outreach efforts associated with transit and freight planning.

This PIP relies on a variety of innovative and engaging outreach tools to reach key stakeholders as well as those who do not typically attend public meetings. It is a mix of traditional and innovative communication tools.

To the greatest extent practicable, the PIP will **rely upon existing AMATS mechanisms** for public review such as the Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC), Technical Advisory Committee (TAC), and Policy Committee (PC). AMATS committees on special topics (air quality, bike and pedestrian, freight) will be invited to participate as well. Final approval via AMATS committees will be reserved for the Public Review Draft/Public Hearing Draft in 2018 and 2019.

Three large public meetings will be held at these milestones:

- Issues Identification based on MTP Goals and Objectives; Development of MTP Performance Measures and Screening Criteria, and System Deficiencies
- Alternatives Development
- Alternatives Evaluation and Preferred Alternative

These meetings will be efficient with the goal of respecting the public's time, while maximizing participation and knowledge retention. In lieu of an open house featuring static graphic posters, our public meetings will feature handouts and an impactful presentation featuring videography, maps, and custom graphics, followed by a public question and answer session that informs the entire audience.

The remainder of the outreach will be conducted through **online and small group outreach**. To the greatest extent possible, public outreach will rely on social media, website, and existing mechanisms to get the word out about the MTP and public involvement opportunities.

### 5 Stakeholders

Identifying stakeholders and understanding their roles and responsibilities is the foundation of a successful plan. This section describes the project team, AMATS and MOA decision-makers, and potential stakeholders.

## 5.1 Project Team

The AMATS Project Team will be the primary group responsible for guiding the project's scope, content, and results. The project team consists of the following individuals:

AMATS Project Manager: Vivian Underwood, MOA, AMATS. Vivian leads the project team and directs the MTP. Vivian is ultimately responsible for coordinating decision-making and providing project direction to the project team.

Other AMATS project team members:

These team members will participate in outreach efforts, assist in keeping AMATS committee members informed, and provide input and review on project deliverables.

Consultant Project Manager: John McPherson, HDR. John is directly engaged in HDR contract performance. John will coordinate with Vivian, direct all work of the consultant team, and provide technical leadership.

Assistant Project Manager: Laurie Cummings, HDR. Laurie will support John to direct the consultant team and provide technical guidance.

Public Involvement Lead: Katherine Wood, HDR. Katherine Wood will be the Public Involvement (PI) lead overseeing the development of the PIP, lead the PI strategy, and work with AMATS to develop key project messages and implement the PIP.

#### 5.2 Committees Roles and Responsibilities

AMATS retains sole authority to make decisions related to the project. While stakeholder feedback will be considered by the planning team, AMATS (through its established review and adoption procedures) will ultimately finalize and adopt the 2040 MTP. The following committees and groups have roles to play in the MTP development.

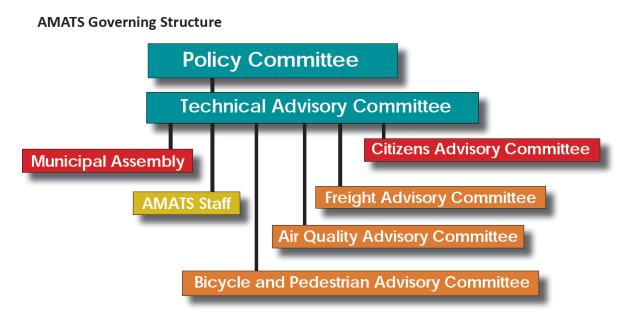


Figure 1: AMATS Governing Structure

AMATS Policy Committee: According to the AMATS PPP, "The AMATS Policy Committee has the authority to act on all matters relating to the continuing, comprehensive, and cooperative transportation and air quality planning process for the area." The PC will approve the Draft MTP and its companion Draft Air Quality Conformity Determination before they are released for Public Review. When all other reviews are complete, the AMATS Policy Committee is the final decision-maker that approves the Final MTP.

**AMATS Technical Advisory Committee:** According to the PPP, "The AMATS Technical Advisory Committee reports to the Policy Committee, and prepares all AMATS plans and programs." The TAC will review and approve the PIP. The TAC will review and approve technical memoranda. The TAC will recommend approval of the Draft MTP and Draft Air Quality Conformity Determination to the Policy Committee.

**AMATS Citizens Advisory Committee:** According to the PPP, "The AMATS Citizens Advisory Committee reviews transportation plans and programs as well as locations and site plans for roadway improvement projects. Members of this group are appointed by the AMATS Policy Committee." The CAC will receive drafts as informational items, not for formal approval, but to provide the opportunity to collaborate on working drafts, and will provide comments and/or recommendations, if desired, to the AMATS TAC.

**AMATS Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee:** According to the PPP, "The AMATS Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee is the citizens' forum for bicycle and pedestrian issues affecting the AMATS area." The BPAC will receive drafts as informational items, not for formal approval, but to provide the opportunity to

collaborate on working drafts, and will provide comments and/or recommendations, if desired, to the AMATS TAC

**AMATS Freight Advisory Committee:** According to the PPP, "The AMATS Freight Advisory Committee is the citizens' forum for freight issues affecting the AMATS area." The FAC will receive drafts as informational items, not for formal approval, but to provide the opportunity to collaborate on working drafts, and will provide comments and/or recommendations, if desired, to the AMATS TAC.

**AMATS Air Quality Advisory Committee:** According to the PPP, "The AMATS Air Quality Advisory Committee is the citizens' forum for air quality issues affecting the AMATS area." The Air Quality Committee will recommend approval of the Draft Air Quality Conformity determination to the TAC.

**MOA Planning and Zoning Commission:** According to the MOA website, "The Planning and Zoning Commission prepares and recommends to the Assembly policies, plans, and ordinances relating to land use planning within the Municipality." The Planning and Zoning Commission will review the Public Hearing Draft MTP, and make recommendations for adoption to the Anchorage Assembly.

**Anchorage Assembly:** According to the PPP, "The Municipal Assembly provides local government review and recommendations on the AMATS plans and programs to the AMATS Technical Advisory Committee and subsequently to the AMATS Policy Committee." The Anchorage Assembly will review and adopt the Public Hearing Draft MTP, with requested changes, as part of the Comprehensive Plan, and make recommendations for approval to the AMATS Policy Committee.

**FHWA/FTA:** Following MTP adoption by the PC, the FHWA/FTA approve the air quality conformity determination.

### 5.3 Stakeholders

As the largest MPO in Alaska, AMATS is a hub area for travel and commerce. Transportation affects everyone who lives, works, visits, and plays in the Anchorage Bowl and Chugiak-Eagle River. Our transportation system also supports a healthy economy by providing efficient movement of people and goods. The MTP has numerous potential stakeholders, including commuters, area residents and businesses, recreational users, federal and state agencies, local government, emergency services, utilities, Tribal governments, Tribal Health Organizations, and non-governmental organizations (NGOs). During outreach, a limited number of small group meetings will be held with key stakeholder agencies or groups with similar or related missions, as appropriate, for example, public safety and natural resource agencies. Table 1 outlines a list of potential stakeholders that is not intended to be exhaustive.

# 5.4 Title VI/LEP Plan to Reach Minority, Low-income, and Limited English Populations

Federal regulations govern public involvement to ensure that all people have equal access to information and equal opportunities to participate in project planning, regardless of age, sex, race, income or English proficiency. Historically, Anchorage experiences a high turnover in residents although this is lessening in recent years (see <a href="Anchorage 2020">Anchorage 2020</a>, Chapter 1 for more details). With nearly 100 languages spoken in area schools, this highly diverse community will continue to grow (<a href="Anchorage 2020">Anchorage 2020</a>, Chapter 1). The AMATS PPP outlines additional steps required to include Anchorage's diverse and low-income populations in transportation planning, as these groups often have difficulty using the transportation system or accessing community services.

To meet these guidelines, the MTP team will translate the fact sheet and frequently asked questions (FAQs) into Spanish, Tagalog, Korean, and Hmong. First-language speaking community entities will receive translated documents to share with their existing networks. All public meetings will be held at transit-accessible locations (with route information published in advertisements). Listening posts at multicultural events and selected community festivals will also reach these groups. Meeting materials will rely on visuals such as maps, charts, graphs, drawings or photos. Meeting and project information will be shared via email or phone with existing community groups identified in Table 1, with a request to forward this information to

their current media outlets. Public meeting flyers will be posted at YMCA, libraries, and other gathering places. Small group meetings may be held with some of the groups, if there is a strong interest in the project. All sign-in sheets will request voluntary gender and race information to support Title VI compliance.

#### 6 **Outreach Tools**

Public involvement activities will correspond with key milestones in the plan's development and has been planned with goals for each phase that share information and provide opportunities to shape the development of that phase. When possible, the project will team up with other ongoing planning projects for listening posts, public open houses, and other shared opportunities. Table 2 below shows which tools will be used to engage different groups.

The following terms are used to describe the different levels of engagement (copyright IAP2):

- Inform: To provide the public with balanced and objective information to assist them in understanding the problems, alternatives, and/or solutions.
- Consult: To obtain public feedback on analysis, alternatives, and/or decisions.
- Involve: To work directly with the public throughout the process to ensure that public issues and concerns are consistently understood and considered.
- **Approve:** To formally accept the document as ready for use.

# 7 AMATS and MOA Reviews and Approvals

In addition to outreach to the general public and stakeholder groups, AMATS and MOA committees have defined review and approval steps required to finalize and adopt the MTP. Table 3 below describes which deliverables receive different levels of review and approval throughout the process. The following terms are used to describe the different levels of review:

- Inform: To receive notice of a draft document.
- Review: To review the draft document and provide written comments on the working draft.
- Recommend: To provide guidance to another committee to take action.
- Approve: To accept the document as ready for use in soliciting further public comment.
- Adopt: To formally accept the document as complete.

# 8 Evaluation

For a PIP to be truly effective, it should be evaluated on a regular basis and refined where needed to garner the largest possible participation. The MTP project team will review the results of outreach on a bi-annual basis, or every six months, of the plan's duration to determine if any changes are needed. Review will consider metrics such as total number of attendees at meetings, number of first time attendees, number of comments received pertaining to MTP, geographic distribution of comments, geographic distribution of our meeting attendees and meeting locations, and comments from low-income and diverse population areas. This review shall be conducted as part of the Project Management Meetings.

# 9 Advertising and Media Plan

All public outreach that occurs as part of existing AMATS meetings (CAC, TAC, or PC) or MOA meetings (i.e., Planning and Zoning Commission), will be advertised via those committees' established outreach methods. In addition, the MTP team shall send an email to the contact list and post the meetings on the project website.

All public meetings shall be advertised in the following manner:

- Alaska Dispatch News print display ad 14 days prior, online ads 10 days prior
- MTP Enewsletter (10 days prior and 1 day prior) and website (10 days prior)
- Public Service Announcements provided to local media outlets (10 days prior)
- Facebook content posts to AMATS and DOT&PF pages (10 to 2 days prior)
- Paid Facebook ads targeted to Anchorage and Chugiak-Eagle River (10 days prior)
- Paid Google ads targeted to Anchorage and Chuqiak-Eagle River (10 days prior)
- What's Up ListServ (per their usual schedule)
- Federation of Community Councils (7 days prior)
- Flyers posted at YMCA, libraries, and other gathering places

**Public Communications.** Communication protocol for all types of external project communications, such as press releases, media briefings, telephone interviews, and communications with elected officials and NGOs, requires that a single point of contact be maintained. Craig Lyon, AMATS Coordinator, will be the point of contact for these communications. All incoming public inquires and comments should be directed to Craig Lyon for instructions. Craig may delegate responding to inquiries to HDR. Outgoing public information shall generally flow through the public involvement lead (Katherine Wood), but will occur at the direction of Craig Lyon/Vivian

Underwood. Any public release of materials or responses will require approval by Craig Lyon/Vivian Underwood.

All formal external correspondence with the general public, media, or NGOs will be from the AMATS Project Manager unless the HDR Project Manager or Public Involvement Lead is directed to make the communication by the AMATS Project Manager.
